

Dr. Jonathan Greenland, M.D., FRCP(C)

Dr. Jonathan Greenland is a radiation oncologist and Divisional Chief of Radiation Oncology at Eastern Health.

After graduating from Memorial University's Faculty of Medicine in 1995, Dr. Greenland entered the residency program for radiation oncology at the University of Western Ontario. In 2000, he established his practice in radiation oncology at the Newfoundland Cancer Treatment and Research Foundation in St. John's, where he specializes in lung and hematologic cancers, as well as palliative radiotherapy. He is the current Divisional Chief of Radiation Oncology, and works in a team environment with nine other radiation oncologists and many other health care professionals.

Dr. Greenland first joined the NLMA Board of Directors in 2002-04 and returned to the Board again in 2012. He was elected to the position of President-Elect in 2014 and installed as President of the NLMA during the 2015 AGM on June 6.

Dr. Greenland is also a Clinical Assistant Professor of Medicine at Memorial University. He was a primary investigator on the MUN Teleoncology project, a research program designed to deliver cancer services throughout the province using live videoconferencing technology. This project became a clinical program, and now teleoncology is a major component of Dr. Greenland's practice. It enables him to assess hundreds of cancer patients who would have otherwise been too unwell to travel or unable to pay for travel expenses. The radiation oncology cancer care program at Eastern Health covers the entire province and receives approximately 1,700-1,800 new cancer consults each year.

He is the founder of the Eastern Health Lymphoma, Urology and the Thoracic Tumor Boards. He is also Co-Chair of the Eastern Health Lung Disease site group and Project Lead for the Lung Cancer Diagnostic Pathway Project at Eastern Health.

Dr. Greenland is also an active participant in the Canadian Partnership Against Cancer (CPAC) lung cancer screening committee. In addition, he holds memberships with the Canadian Association of Radiation Oncologists, the Canadian Institute for Quality and Radiotherapy, the American Society of Therapeutic Radiology and Oncology and the European Society of Therapeutic Radiotherapy and Oncology.

Dr. Greenland is the recipient of the Zeneca Award for Resident Research and in 2000 he was awarded a grant from the Varian Oncology Systems-London Regional Cancer Centre for research in Inverse Treatment Planning. His work has been published in numerous medical journals including the *Canadian Journal of Urology*, *Clinical and Investigative Medicine* and the *International Journal of Radiation Oncology*.

He lives with his wife Tammy and their three boys in St. John's and enjoys sailing and growing vegetables in his garden.
